#### Screening Tools: Quick but Limited

Screening tools offer a snapshot of symptoms, helping to identify areas of concern.

However, they:

- Rely on Self-Reports: Vulnerable to exaggeration or minimisation of symptoms (e.g., impression management).
- Lack Context: Do not explore the functional impact or the origins of symptoms.
- Miss Nuance: Provide limited insight into the severity or duration of symptoms.

#### **Clinical Interviews: Adding Depth**

A clinical interview integrates symptom exploration with observations, adding layers of understanding. It allows for:

- **Detailed Symptom Exploration:** The 5 Ps framework (Predisposing, Precipitating, Perpetuating, Protective, and Presenting factors) provides a structured way to assess how symptoms develop and are maintained.
- Observational Insights: Evaluates emotional regulation, consistency in narrative, and presentation, which can indicate impression management or malingering.
- Guiding Further Tools: Determines when more advanced tools are necessary for verification.

#### Gold Standard Assessments: Structured and Validated

These tools offer the depth needed for defensible conclusions. However, while these tools provide reliable data, they:

- Require time and expertise to administer and interpret.
- Depend on being paired with clinical interviews and collateral information to form a comprehensive picture.

## **Collateral Information: Expanding Context**

Third-party input (e.g., from teachers, family members, or previous medical records) ensures a more rounded understanding of the client's functioning across contexts. This is critical in forensic and legal cases where corroboration is essential.

Legal decisions require objective, defensible evidence, which screening tools alone cannot provide. Comprehensive assessments ensure:

- Accurate differentiation between normal and disordered behaviour.
- Identification of impression management and other biases.
- Contextualised and standardised findings that stand up to scrutiny.
